

Archdiocesan Mission Statement



Taking to heart the last words of the Lord Jesus, we will go into the world to proclaim the Good News to the whole of creation.

GOSPEL REFLECTION

In today's Gospel, the Sadducees - a religious group in Jesus' day, pit their interpretation of the law against what they regard as a strange innovation, that is, belief in the resurrection. They attempt to ridicule the resurrection of the dead by recalling the Law of Moses on Marriage. The Law stated that if a man dies and has no son, and, therefore, no legal heir, his brother must marry the widow so that the "first son whom she bears shall succeed to the name of his brother who is dead" (Deuteronomy 25:5). In this way, the continuity of the family line was guaranteed. The Sadducees develop an example about seven brothers, each one marries the same woman, and each one of them dies childless. Their argument, made before Jesus, is whose wife would the woman be in the resurrection of the dead? In his reply, Jesus makes it clear that there is no comparison between human life, shared by all, and the resurrection, shared by those who are children of God. Jesus makes the distinction between two ages and two peoples: the people of this age and those who are chosen to share in the resurrection. Jesus does not speak of the resurrection of all people, but resurrection from the dead of those people who "are accounted worthy" to share this new age with God. As children of God, they cannot die again - therefore marriage does not apply to them. There will be no need to increase the human race, in this new age, or to ensure legal succession. Therefore, the question of the Sadducees concerning marriage is irrelevant. Since in the resurrection of the dead ALL are sons and daughters of God, therefore their relationship is as members of the same family.

Jesus uses the scripture that the Sadducees do accept. Moses called God the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac and the God of Jacob. If there were no resurrection the Sadducees argument would imply that these great names from the Old Testament – very important figures to the religion of the time and to Jesus himself – would be dead forever. This would not make sense for any practicing Jew at the time. If the Lord is God of the living, then he will continue to be so to those who have died. Relationship with God does not end in death. To God ALL people are alive. Jesus' argument with the Sadducees may seem too remote for our modern ears. However, through his argument Jesus reveals something of his own belief in God – a God who keeps his promise to all his faithful ones even when they die. Jesus does more than argue the point. He himself becomes the case in point when he dies on the cross and experiences the glory of the resurrection when God refuses to let death have the last word. Jesus himself becomes the ultimate argument against the Sadducees.

In this month of November, when we remember those who have gone before us, Jesus' words should echo in our ears as we pray for all our loved ones. It challenges us to ask ourselves who or what do we believe in. There are so many moments in the Gospel when Jesus promises us a place in Heaven if we follow him here on earth. How do we show that we believe this in the way we live our lives today?

Synod of Bishops on the Family 2014

Pope Francis has announced an extraordinary general session of the Synod of Bishops at the Vatican between 5-19 October 2014. The purpose of the Synod is to discuss the "pastoral challenges of the family in the context of evangelization". This is only the third 'extraordinary' synod since Pope Paul VI reinstituted synods in 1965. According to the Code of Canon Law, an "extraordinary general session" of the synod is held to "deal with matters which require a speedy solution."

We have been given an opportunity to participate in preparing for the Synod by completing a questionnaire, which you can find on the website of the Catholic Church in England and Wales www.catholicchurch.org.uk Although the questionnaire is quite long, PLEASE have a look at it and complete what you can - don't worry if you can't complete it all.
