GOSPEL REFLECTION

Once upon a time, a man was caught stealing and was brought before the king, who immediately gave orders that he should be executed. However, as he was being led to the gallows, the man told the prison governor that he had a wonderful secret which was given to him by his father. He claimed that using this secret he could plant the seed of a pomegranate and make it grow and bear fruit overnight. He said that it would be a pity if the secret died with him, and that he was willing to reveal it to the king. The governor was so impressed with the idea that he halted the execution and brought the man before the king. There, the man dug a hole in the ground and, taking a pomegranate seed, said, "Your Majesty, the seed must be planted by a person who has never taken anything that didn't belong to him. It must be a man of great virtue and honesty. I, being a thief, cannot do it." Then, turning to one of the king's officials, he said, "Perhaps you would like to plant it." But the official refused saying, "In my younger days, I kept something that didn't belong to me." Then the man turned to the king's treasurer and said, "Well then, maybe you would like to plant it." But the treasurer too refused, saying, "Over the years I've handled a lot of money. Now and again I may have kept a little for myself," And so it went on. Finally, there was only the king left. Turning to him the man said, "Perhaps your Majesty would do the honour of planting the seed." But the king said, "I'm ashamed to say it, but once I kept a watch that belonged to my father and I never gave it back, so I can't plant the seed either." Then the thief said, "All of you are great and powerful people and want for nothing. Yet none of you can plant the seed, whilst I who have stolen a little because I was hungry must pay for it with my life." The king felt moved to pardon him.

That story would have ended differently if the king had not been prepared to listen. Instead, thanks to his patience and thanks to the imagination of the condemned man, no one died and they all learned a valuable lesson.

The Gospel we hear today could have ended in a very ugly manner. If Jesus had gone along with the script of the Scribes and Pharisees, the woman would have died a horrible death. Who would have benefited from that? Instead, thanks to the understanding and compassion Jesus showed her, she was able to put this whole episode behind her and make a new start. The fact that he didn't condemn her does not mean that Jesus thought lightly of adultery, or of any sin for that matter. He realised that she had already been condemned. What she needed now was compassion. He treated her in such a way that it made her want to reform her life. What God wants is NOT the death of the sinner, but the conversion of the sinner. In his wisdom, God understands our weakness, and in his mercy he forgives our sins. He not only helps us to put our sins behind us, but to draw good from them. And surely the fact that we have all sinned, and stand continually in need of God's mercy, will help us when we feel like throwing the stones of condemnation at others.
