

Taking to heart the last words of the Lord Jesus, we will go into the world to proclaim the Good News to the whole of creation.

## **GOSPEL REFLECTION**

In today's First Reading, we hear the story of Amos. He lived in a small town called Tekoa, just five miles from Bethlehem. He received a call from God to leave his flock and become a prophet. It is not the career he would ever have chosen for himself, but he does it because he believes that it is God's call. He is sent to the northern kingdom of Israel, a society that is sharply and cruelly divided between the rich and the poor. Through the mouth of Amos, the invisible God speaks to his people. Amos confronts the vast problem of social injustice by publicly criticising those who cannot wait for the religious festivities to end so that they can get back to their real devotion of exploiting the poor. What is the point of impressive liturgies that feed the egos of the rich and powerful when the poor are left as the permanent victims of an unjust system? When liturgy becomes the ally of oppression, it becomes an affront to God. When the worship of God remains wholly uncritical of what is happening in an unjust society, it becomes a privileged theatre signifying nothing. For the prophet Amos, the best liturgical music is when justice sounds through the land.

The same point is made by Jesus in today's Gospel. He comes from the same area as Amos and has a similar message: "You cannot be the slave both of God and of money." Jesus expresses his belief that people who cannot be trusted with money can hardly be trusted with the genuine riches of the Kingdom of God. Jesus tells his listeners an unusual story which seems to support dishonesty. A steward who manages his master's estates is accused of wasting his employer's goods. He is dismissed, but before he goes, he must submit his final account. This gives the steward time to plan his future. He is about to join the ranks of the unemployed and he wonders how he will survive. He doesn't waste much time looking at digging and begging as job-creation schemes. Instead, he calls in those who owe his master money and deals with them one by one. As a smart operator, he knows the value of secrecy. He gives the debtors offers that they cannot refuse by reducing the amount that they owe. By the time he has finished, all these merchants owe him a huge favour for his inventive arithmetic. Now, his job prospects look healthy. His future is looking good, In a time of crisis, the steward takes firm and immediate action to ensure his own future will be good. He is praised, not for his dishonesty, but for his resourcefulness in coping with an emergency with such speed. If a dishonest man can use his employer's money to ensure there will be people to welcome him and employ him when he is out of a job, how much more should honest people use all that they have to ensure that they will be welcomed into the Kingdom of God. This is not to argue that anyone can buy their way into God's Kingdom. They can't. The story acknowledges that if the use of money and wealth is unrelated to the values of God's Kingdom then usually people get hurt. And the people who usually get hurt most are the poor.

Whenever God speaks to us, a reminder about the poor and the needy is never far away. Amos and Jesus both voice God's concerns for social justice and personal responsibility to look after others. The worship of God HAS to influence the way we live and care about others. Our love for each other indicates our worthiness of the gift of God's Kingdom. It's all tied together.
