

Taking to heart the last words of the Lord Jesus, we will go into the world to proclaim the Good News to the whole of creation.

GOSPEL REFLECTION

Like the famous story of the Prodigal Son, the young man in today's Gospel wants his share of the inheritance that should be divided between himself and his brother. He brings his request to Jesus since rabbis were expected to give judgement on a whole range of subjects concerning law. This included civil, criminal and religious questions. But Jesus refuses to take up the role of the judge. Instead, he communicates as a storyteller, inviting the young man to take his wisdom from the story rather than his rights from the law. Instead of dividing the inheritance between the two brothers, Jesus focuses on why the inheritance has divided the two brothers. Where Jesus is, a story is sure to follow. A rich farmer is blessed with an abundance of crops. His reaction is not to rejoice with others but to talk to himself until he has worked out a way to store all this abundance and keep it secure. In looking after himself, he focuses on what he owns rather than on what he can share. His life if governed by his own possessions: his crops, his barns, his grain, his goods. He thinks that he owns his future and that nothing can spoil it in any way. His world is seen in terms of what he owns rather than who he is. The rich man, in Jesus' story, is dead already. He is buried up to his neck in his own grain. His world is unrelated to the fortune or fate of any other human being. He thinks that his possessions will insure his future when in fact they will go to anyone but him. The rich man dies twice: he dies in life and he dies leaving it. His funeral only confirms what has happened a long time ago.

God very rarely appears in parables, but he appears in this one and calls the rich man a fool. The rich man is a real idiot in the truest sense of the word. The word idiot comes from the Greek "idiotes". meaning "the one who is alone." Although he is made in the image of his creator, he does not live as the creator does. As St. Paul says in today's Second Reading, our new self must be renewed in the image of our creator. God's creativity moves out to touch the lives of others. He shares his richness with others. In the end, God gives himself away; and that is why the rich man is alone - he does not share any of his goods, or himself for that matter, with anyone else. In contrast to the rich man in Jesus' story, Jesus spends himself. He spends his whole life sharing his talent for forgiveness, his insight, his love, his energy, his imagination, his prayer, his stories. The list is endless. All these qualities create new life for others. Jesus keeps nothing to himself because he regards nothing as his: he says that everything he is and has comes from the Father. What Jesus owns, God owns too. This way of living creatively is something Jesus hopes for in his own disciples. As his disciples, the inheritance that Jesus has given us is not to divide brother from brother, or sister from sister, but to unite people in the gifts God has given to us and for us all. The inheritance we have received from God is one we are pledged to give away. In Gospel terms, this makes us rich and blessed and can make our world, and the world of those around us, a better place.
